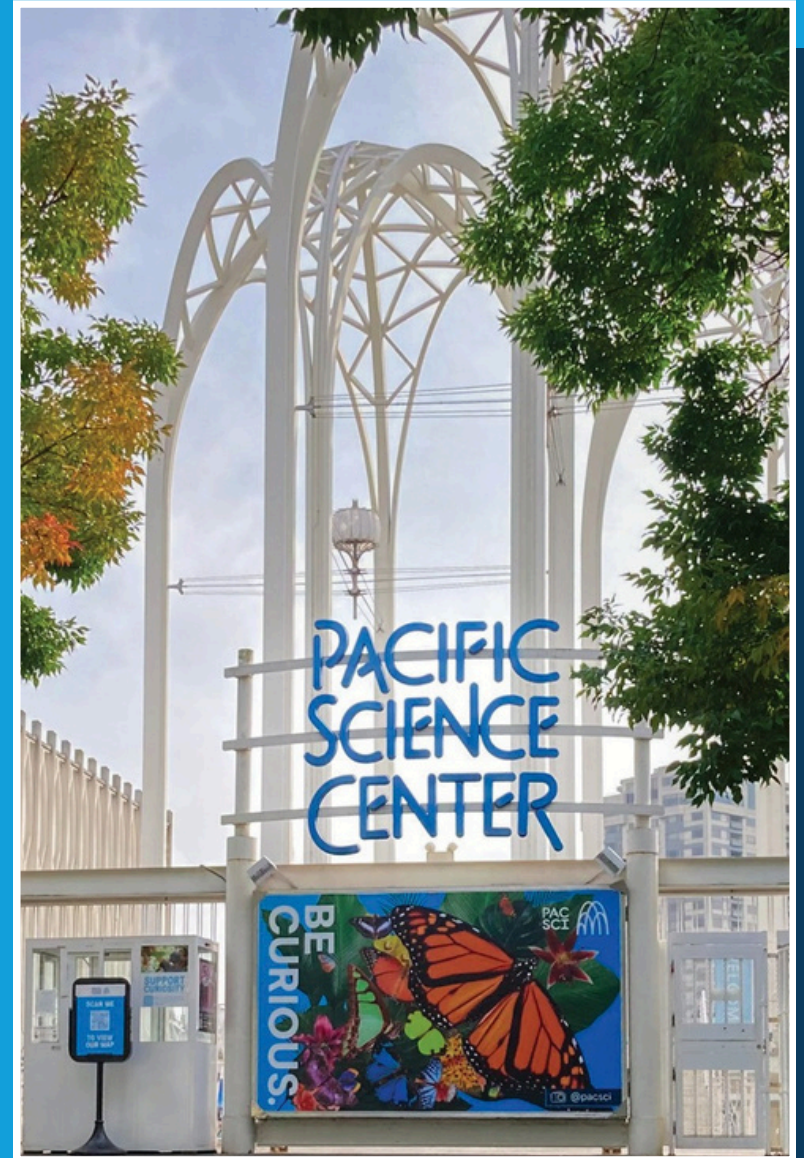


WHEN I VISIT PACIFIC SCIENCE CENTER

A story about what to expect when you visit the Science Center.



Arrival and Courtyard

When I visit Pacific Science Center, I may arrive by car, bus, train, bike, or on sidewalks.

Everyone is welcome in the outdoor courtyard. The courtyard is open to the public and does not require a ticket.



Outdoor Courtyard

The courtyard has water features and outdoor exhibits.

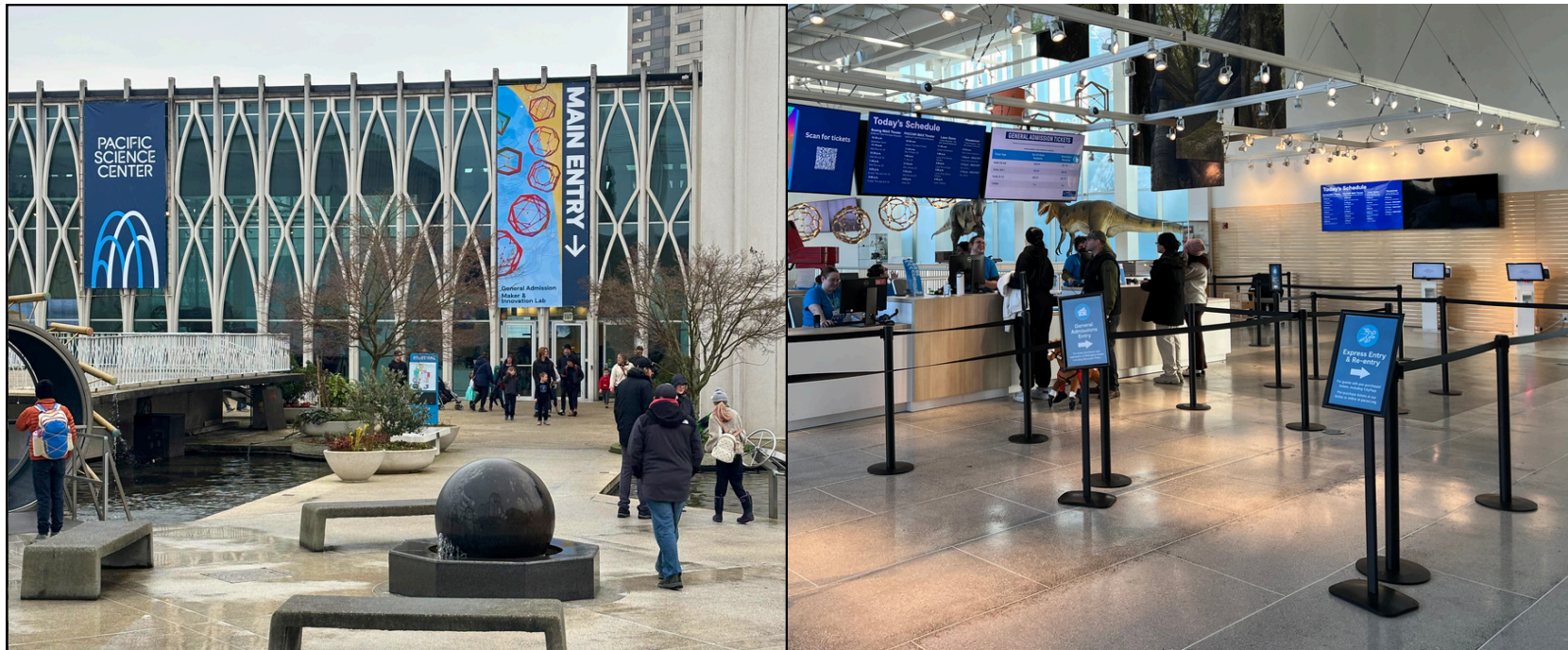
I can stay on the paths and look at the water. If I feel comfortable, I can use water cannons and walk in a large water wheel.



Tickets and Admission

To enter the indoor exhibits, I will go to the **Main Entry** to get my ticket. There may be a short wait in line with other guests.

Staff are available if I need help.



Entering PacSci

After my ticket is scanned, I will be inside Pacific Science Center. There are stairs, ramps, elevators, and doors throughout the building.

If I lose my group or need help, I can ask the people in blue PacSci shirts. If the exhibits are too loud, I can also ask them for a sensory kit with noise-reducing headphones.



Maker and Innovation Lab

The **Maker and Innovation Lab** is on the bottom floor. It can be louder because of echoes. I can use tools to build, invent, and explore.

These activities change often, so the space may look different each time I visit.



Live Science Stage

Science shows happen on the **Live Science Stage** during the day. A schedule board shows the daily showtimes.

Some shows may include loud sounds or bright lights. I can ask staff for details before the show begins.



Brainy Bodies Exhibit

At **Brainy Bodies**, I can explore how my brain and body work together.

Some experiences make sounds that could be loud. I may notice people jumping and dancing while they explore.



Big Moves Exhibit

At **Big Moves**, I can explore motion and force. I may feel wind and see machines like pulleys and wind tubes moving. Balls, scarves, or fog might float through the air.



Destination: Outer Space Exhibit

At **Destination: Outer Space**, I can explore the universe and what scientists are discovering.

I may see bright planets and stars, hear sounds, try hands-on activities, and wait to sit in the space capsule.



Sensory Lounge Exhibit

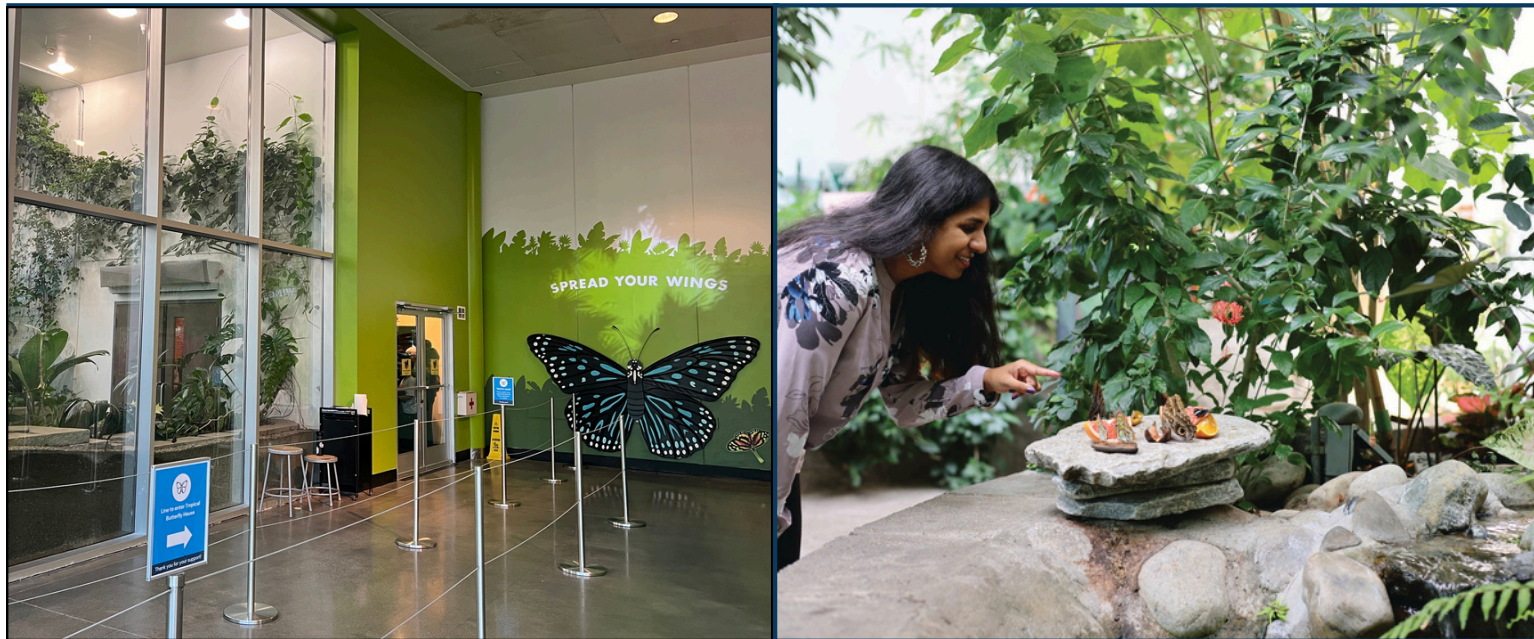
The **Sensory Lounge** is a quiet space where I can rest and reset my focus. I may notice softer lights, gentle sounds, and textured walls or furniture. I can sit, read, or try a puzzle.



Tropical Butterfly House

The **Tropical Butterfly House** is warm and full of plants, like a rainforest. When I enter, I will listen to an educator before I explore.

Butterflies fly all around. I can help protect them by not touching them and moving carefully.



Spiders: From Fear to Fascination

Spiders: From Fear to Fascination is an exhibit about spiders.

I may see live spiders in clear, locked enclosures. I can also explore videos and activities about spiders.



Laser Dome and Planetarium

Some experiences require a separate ticket, such as the Planetarium and Laser Shows.

The **Planetarium** is a dark room where I can see stars and planets on a big screen. **Laser Dome** shows includes bright lights and music.



IMAX® Theater

The IMAX Theaters also require special tickets. I can watch documentaries or feature movies here. When the show starts, the theater will become dark and play loud sounds. If it is too loud, I can help me ask staff for headphones or earplugs.

There are many exciting things to see and do at Pacific Science Center. I get to explore at my own pace, and the staff are here to support me.
