MOLLIE H. BEATTIE (1947-1996)

Imagine being able to channel your passions into a career ... That's exactly what Mollie Beattie did. Mollie Beattie was a fierce conservationist who fought to protect our nation's natural resources and wildlife. Born in Vermont, she became the first-ever female director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

On January 12, 1995, Mollie literally carried Alpha Female Wolf No. 5 into Yellowstone National Park. Grey wolves had been missing from the park for more than 50 years. Mollie and her team worked tirelessly to support the growth of the Crystal Creek pack of wolves, releasing them from their enclosure in the Lamar Valley. This resilient pack of wolves has grown into one of the longest-running packs, leading to more than 100 grey wolves roaming the park today.

Sadly, Mollie passed away in 1996 from cancer at an early age. Her legacy lives on, however. Her home state named the Mollie Beattie State Forest after her, and then-President Clinton renamed the eight-million-acre Arctic National Wildlife Refuge Wilderness to Mollie Beattie Wilderness in her honor. Plus, due to her memorable role in wolf conservation, that Crystal Creek wolf pack is now and forever known as "Mollie's Pack."

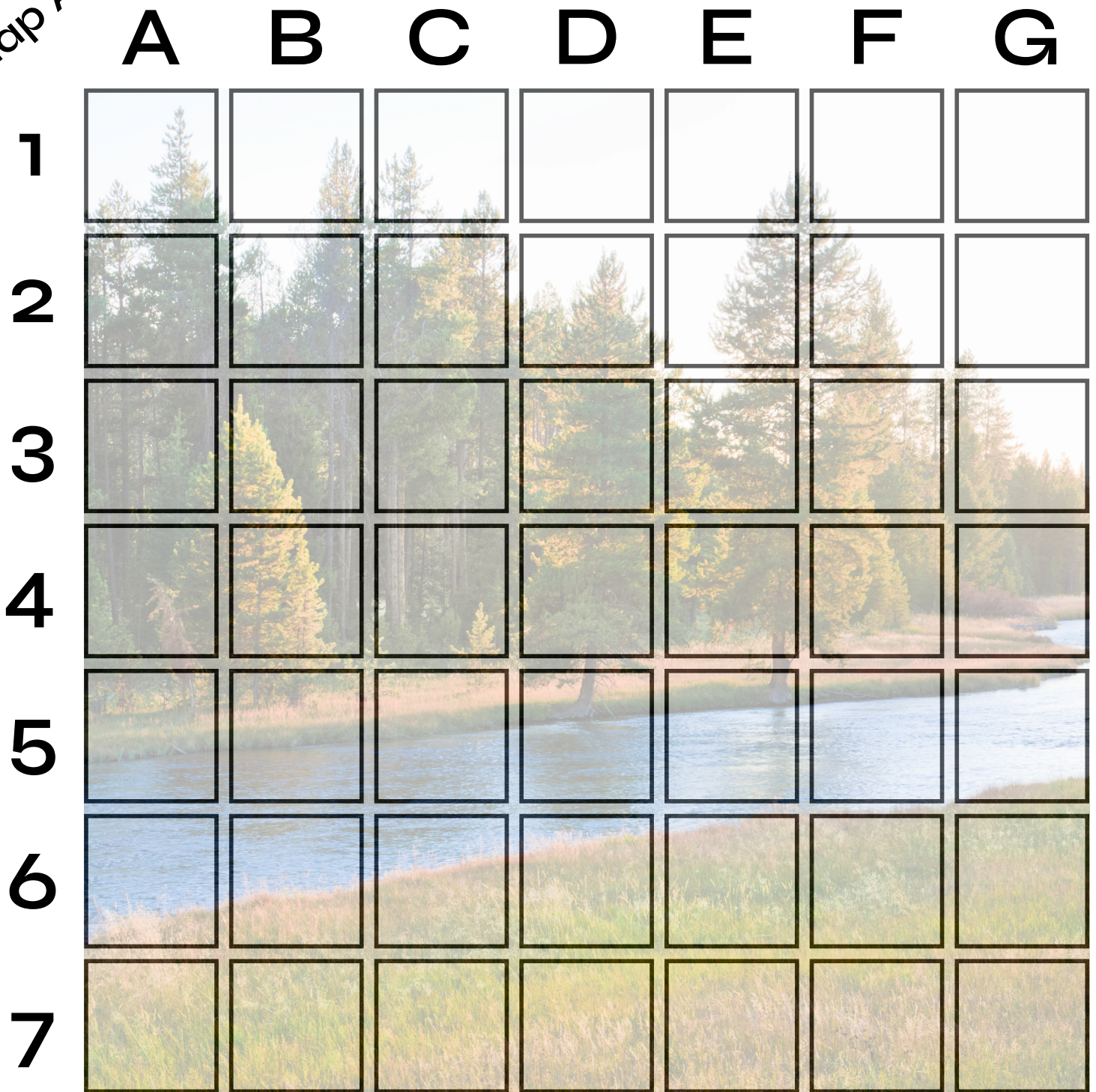

THE GREY WOLF

As the largest of the dog family, grey wolves (*canis lupus*) can be found across the Northern Hemisphere in mountains, tundra, forests, and grasslands. These carnivores can grow up to 175 pounds! With a sense of smell one hundred times stronger than a human's, they can hunt down prey like elk and deer and sniff out danger. They can eat up to 20 pounds of meat in one meal, allowing them to go for days without eating.

Did you know that wolves run on their toes? Wolves' narrow chests and powerful legs are designed for endurance. They can run 40 miles per day and reach a speed of 40 miles per hour in short bursts — that's as fast as a car!



Wolves are social animals and live in a pack or family of 2-8 wolves. They have litters of 4-6 pups, who tend to be quite playful. Wolves like to communicate with each other through whimpers, barks, growls, and howls. Their sounds can travel up to ten miles.

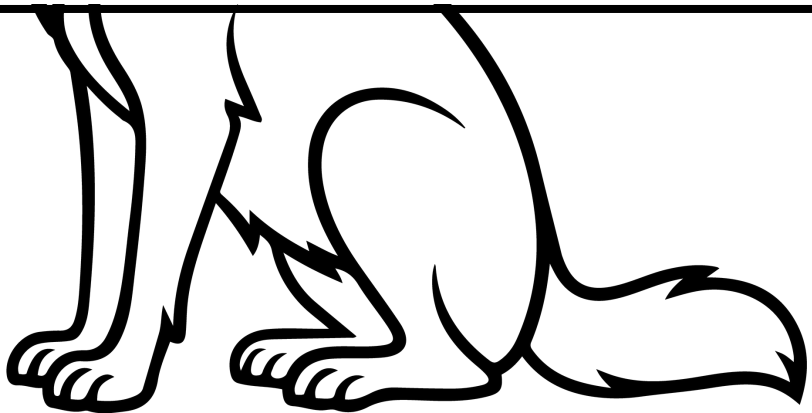
